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# Featured Speakers

## **Diane Nash** | Opening Plenary Keynote Speaker, Thursday, April 6

### **Freedom Rider and Founder of the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee**

Diane Nash's involvement in the nonviolent movement began in 1959 while she was a student at Fisk University. In 1960, Nash became the chairperson of the student sit-in movement in Nashville, Tennessee—the first southern city to desegregate its lunch counters—as well as one of the founding students of the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee. In 1961, Nash coordinated the Freedom Ride from Birmingham, Alabama, to Jackson, Mississippi. Her many arrests for her civil rights activities culminated in Nash being imprisoned for 30 days in 1961, while she was pregnant with her first child. Undeterred, she went on to join a national committee—to which she was appointed by President John F. Kennedy—that promoted passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Nash later became active in the peace movement that worked to end the Vietnam War, and became an instructor in the philosophy and strategy of non-violence as developed by Mohandas Gandhi. Diane Nash is the recipient of numerous awards, including the War Resisters' League Peace Award; the Distinguished American Award presented by the John F. Kennedy Library; the LBJ Award for Leadership in Civil Rights from the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library and Museum; and an honorary doctorate of human letters from Fisk University, her alma mater.

## **Tim Wise** | Opening Plenary Keynote Speaker, Friday, April 7

### **Anti-racism Author and Educator**

Tim Wise, whom scholar and philosopher Cornel West calls, “A vanilla brother in the tradition of (abolitionist) John Brown,” is among the nation's most prominent anti-racist essayists and educators. He has spent the past 25 years speaking to audiences in all 50 states, on over 1000 college and high school campuses, at hundreds of professional and academic conferences, and to community groups across the nation. He has also lectured internationally and has trained corporate, government, law enforcement and medical industry professionals on methods for dismantling racism in their institutions. Wise is the author of seven books, including his latest, *Under the Affluence: Shaming the Poor, Praising the Rich and Sacrificing the Future of America* (City Lights Books) and his highly acclaimed memoir, *White Like Me: Reflections on Race from a Privileged Son* (recently updated and re-released by Soft Skull Press).

## **Dr. Gail Christopher** | Closing Plenary Keynote Speaker, Friday, April 7

### **Vice President for Policy and Senior Advisor, W.K. Kellogg Foundation**

Dr. Gail Christopher is vice president for policy and senior advisor for the W.K. Kellogg Foundation in Battle Creek, Michigan. In this role, she serves on the president's cabinet that provides overall direction and leadership for the foundation. Since joining the foundation in 2007, Gail has served as vice president for program strategy with responsibility for multiple areas of programming, including Racial Equity; Food, Health & Well-Being; Community Engagement and Leadership; as well as place-based programming in New Orleans and New Mexico. Dr. Christopher is a nationally recognized leader in health policy, with particular expertise and experience in the issues related to social determinants of health, health disparities, and public policy issues of concern to African Americans and other minority populations. She brings extensive knowledge and experience in creating a comprehensive approach to well-being and is nationally recognized for her pioneering work to infuse holistic health and diversity concepts into public sector programs and policy discourse. Her distinguished career and contributions to public service have been honored numerous times with awards. Dr. Christopher is the author or co-author of three books, a monthly column in the *Federal Times*, and more than 250 articles, presentations, and publications. She holds a Doctor of Naprapathy degree from the Chicago National College of Naprapathy in Illinois and completed advanced study in the interdisciplinary Ph.D. program in holistic health and clinical nutrition at the Union for Experimenting Colleges and Universities at Union Graduate School of Cincinnati, Ohio.

## *Lifetime Achievement Award*

### **Charles James Ogletree, Jr.**

The Conference Committee is honored to present Charles James Ogletree, Jr. with a lifetime achievement award during the *Dr. Joseph McNeil Luncheon*, on Thursday, April 6, 2017. Professor Ogletree is a prominent civil rights activist and one of the most respected trial lawyers in country. A graduate of Harvard University School of Law, Ogletree's legal



career began as a staff attorney at the District of Columbia Public Defender Service. In 1992, he became the Jesse Climenko Professor of Law at Harvard Law School. Subsequently, Ogletree founded the Charles Hamilton Houston Institute for Race and Justice and various other social justice focused clinics. His commitment as an attorney, professor, and individual, to racial justice and his unwavering support and protection of the constitution for all individuals, is reminiscent of the early inception of American freedom for all in Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. The Conference is presenting Professor Ogletree with the 1968 For Peace and Justice Medal, gilded in the Netherlands, and presented to individuals who exemplify the dedication to fighting injustice and blazing the trail for people of color much like Martin Luther King, Robert Kennedy, President John F. Kennedy, and President Abraham Lincoln, all present on the medal.

### **White Like Me** by Tim Wise

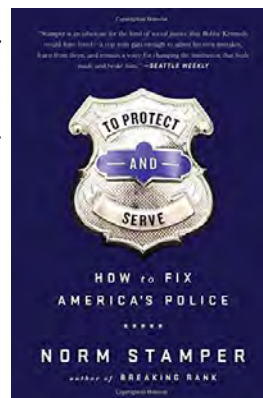


White Like Me is one-part memoir, one-part polemical essay collection. It is a personal examination of the way in which racial privilege shapes the daily lives of white Americans in all realms: employment, education, housing, criminal justice, and elsewhere. Using stories from his own life, Wise demonstrates the ways in which racism not

only burdens people of color, but also benefits, in relative terms, those who are "white like him." He discusses how racial privilege can harm whites in the long run and make progressive social change less likely.

### **To Protect and Serve** by Norm Stamper

Stamper delivers a groundbreaking new model for American law enforcement: the community-based police department. It calls for fundamental changes in the federal government's role in local policing as well as citizen participation in all aspects of police operations: policymaking, program development, crime fighting and service delivery,



education, training, oversight, and joint community-police crisis management. Nothing will ever change until the system itself is radically restructured, and here Stamper shows us how.

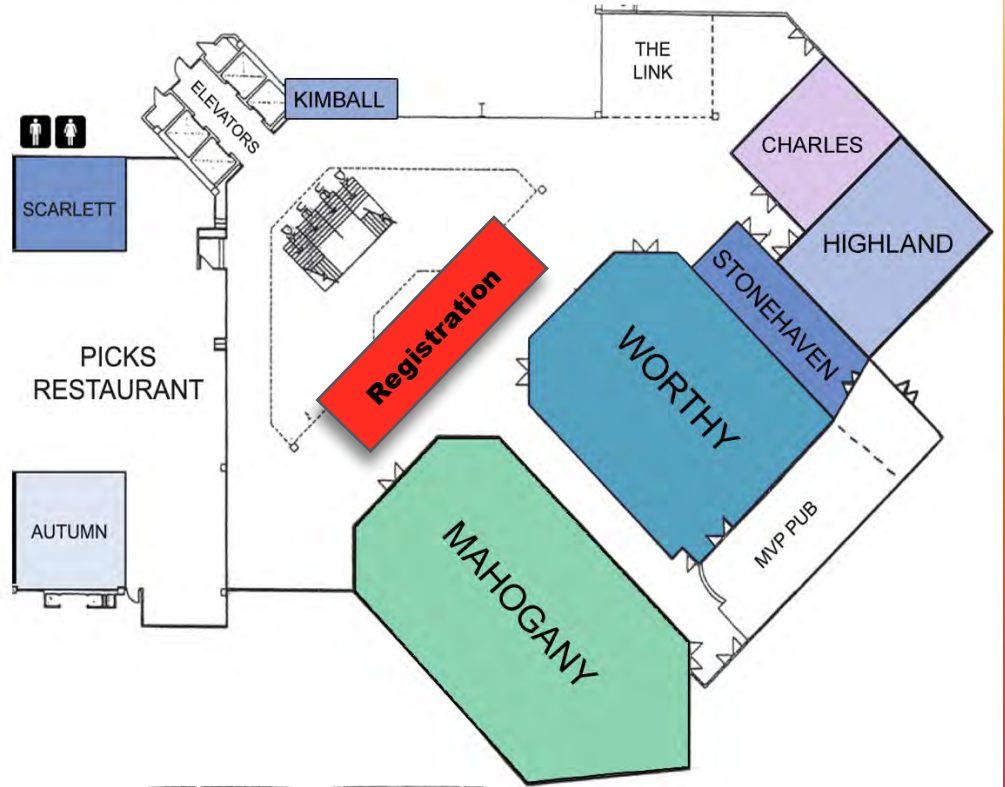
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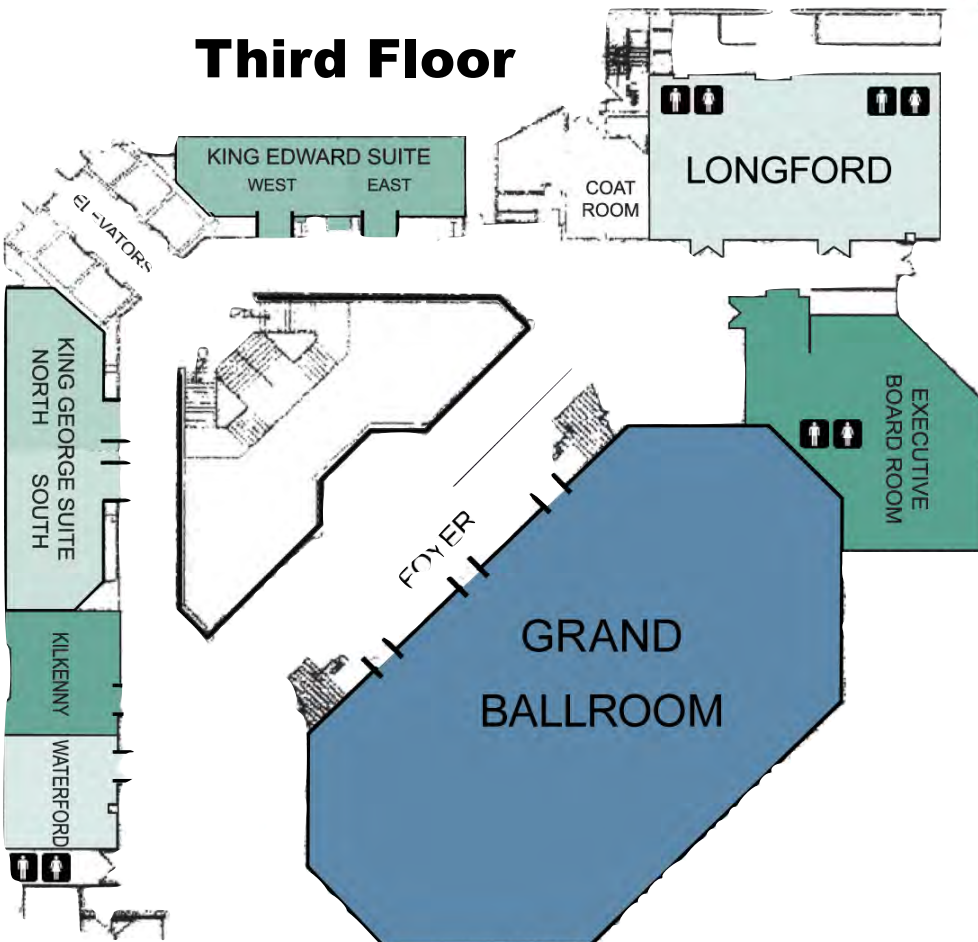
